
Euxoa messoria Reaper Dart



FAMILY: Noctuidae SUBFAMILY: Noctuinae TRIBE: Noctuini

TAXONOMIC_COMMENTS: One of 181 species that occur in North America north of Mexico (Lafontaine and Schmidt, 2010). Most are Western but 13 have been recorded in North Carolina. Euxoa messoria belongs to subgenus Longivesica (Lafontaine, 1987), which contains three other species, none of which has been recorded in North Carolina.

HABITAT:

FOOD: Larvae are polyphagous, feeding on many species of agricultural importance. Wagner et al. (2011) specifically list Garden Onion (<i>Allium cepa</i>), Turnip (<i>Brassica rapa</i>), strawberry (<i>Fragaria</i>), Sweet Potato (<i>Ipomoea batatas</i>), Garden Lettuce (<i>Lactuca sativa</i>), apple (<i>Malus</i>), Cultivated Tobacco (<i>Nicotiana tabacum</i>), Garden Pea (<i>Pisum sativum</i>), Peach (<i>Prunus persica</i>), Garden Radish (<i>Raphanus sativus</i>), currant (<i>Ribes</i>), Garden Tomato (<i>Solanum lycopersicum</i>), clover (<i>Trifolium</i>), grape (<i>Vitis</i>), and Corn (<i>Zea mays</i>).
