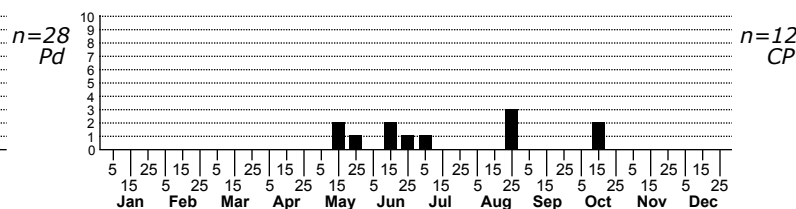
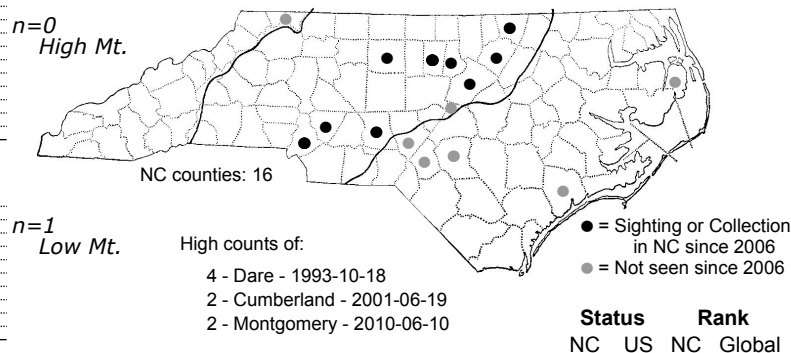
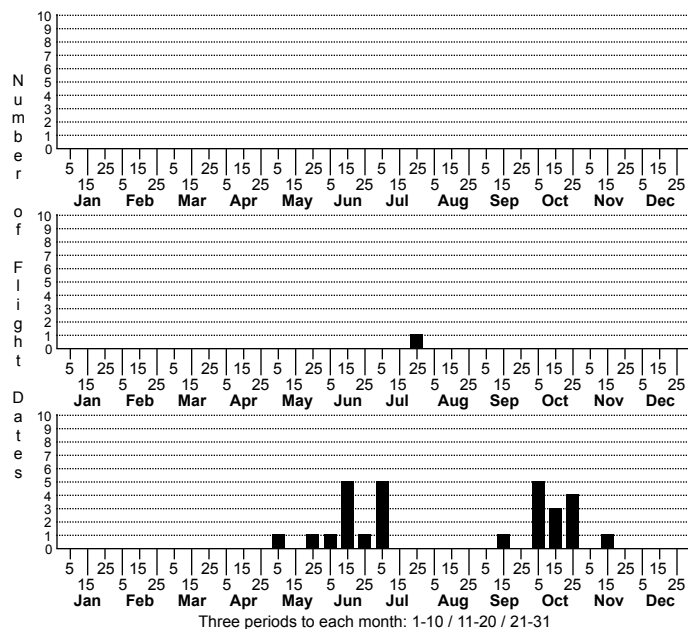


Abagrotis magnicipida One-dotted Dart

ID COMMENTS: The ground color is typically a brick red. The spots and lines are usually poorly marked but there is a conspicuous black patch located on the costa just before the subterminal line; a black spot may also occur in the lower part of the reniform. The labial palpus is black on the sides (Lafontaine, 1998).

HABITAT: Our records come from a wide variety of habitats, ranging from the barrier islands to montane river valleys. Both open, herb-dominated habitats and closed-canopy forests are used, as are both nutrient-rich and nutrient-poor habitats.

FOOD: Lafontaine (1998) listed Choke Cherry (*Prunus virginiana*) as a host. However, Wagner et al. (2011) stated that larvae are polyphagous, feeding on many species of both herbaceous and woody plants. Shropshire and Tallamy (2025) specifically list asters, *Cichorium*, *Digitaria*, *Erigeron*, *Malus*, *Prunus*, *Taraxacum*, and *Vitis*. We do not have any feeding records in North Carolina.
