




Xenotemna pallorana Pallid Leafroller Moth

HABITAT:

FOOD: Larvae are polyphagous, feeding on a wide variety of plants. Reported hosts include Alfalfa (*Medicago sativa*), apple (*Malus*), asters, cherry (*Prunus*), clover (*Trifolium*), elm (*Ulmus*), goldenrod (*Solidago*), pine (*Pinus*), rose (*Rosa*), strawberry (*Fragaria*), and St. John's-wort (*Hypericum*) (Robinson et al., 2010). On BugGuide, MJ Hatfield has rearing records for Giant Ragweed (*Ambrosia trifida*), White Wild Indigo (*Baptisia alba*), and White Sweetclover (*Melilotus albus*). The host plants used in North Carolina are unknown.
