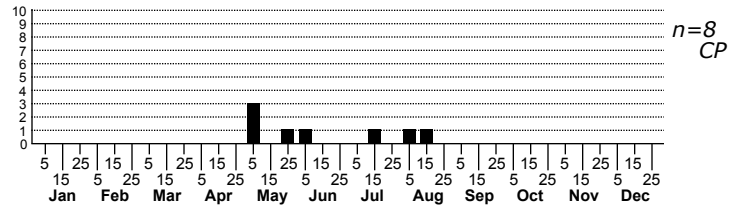
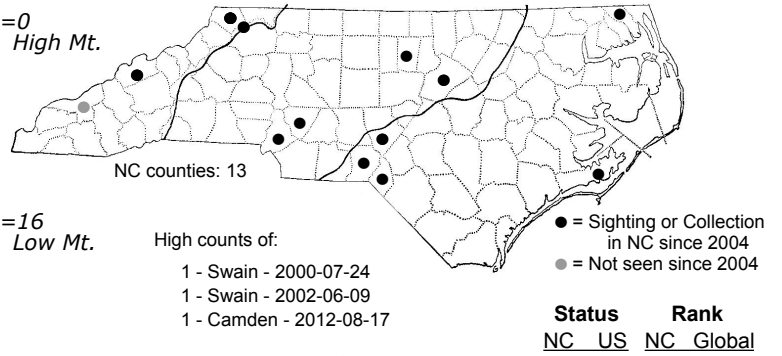
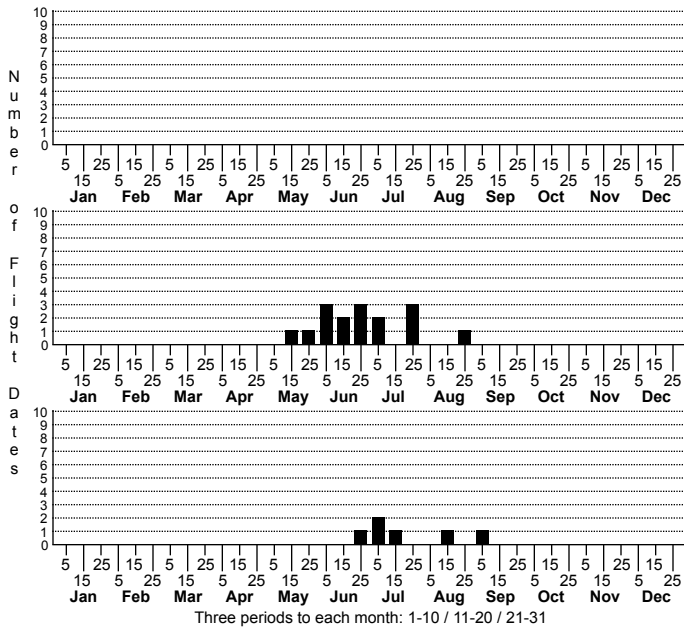


Actrix nyssaecolella Tupelo Leaffolder Moth

ID COMMENTS: "I have been unable to detect any difference in the external appearance of the adults of *A. dissimulatrix* and *A. nyssaecolella*. Nevertheless, the genitalia of the two species leave no doubt that *A. dissimulatrix* is a distinct species" (Neunzig, 2003).

HABITAT: Our records come mainly from upland stands of hardwoods, but also from sites in the Coastal Plain which include upland and bottomland sites in close proximity

FOOD: Larvae feed on *Nyssa* species (Robinson et al., 2010). Based on the location of our records for confirmed specimens, Blackgum (*Nyssa sylvatica*) is likely used over most of the state but Swamp Tupelo (*N. biflora*) may also be used in the coastal plain.
