

ID COMMENTS: "I have been unable to detect any difference in the external appearance of the adults of <i>A. dissimulatrix</i> and <i>A. nyssaecolella</i> Nevertheless, the genitalia of the two species leave no doubt that <i>dissimulatrix</i> is a distinct species" (Neunzig, 2003).

DISTRIBUTION: Our genitalia-based identifications as of 2024 are all from the Coastal Plain, which suggests that populations farther west are very likely <i>A. nyssaecolella</i>

HABITAT: All of our confirmed records for this species come from Coastal Plain sites located near blackwater wetlands, although upland stands may be closely adjacent.

FOOD: Larvae feed on tupelo, and Heinrich (1956) listed Swamp Tupelo (<i>Nyssa biflora</i>) as a host plant. All of our sites where this species has been confirmed by dissection are located in habitats that contain <i>N. biflora</i>, although Blackgum (<i>N. sylvatica</i>) may also be present.
