

HABITAT: Barrens, woodlands, and forests (Wagner, 2005). Our records come from dune grasslands on barrier islands, longleaf pine savannas and flatwoods, and dry ridges.

FOOD: Larvae are polyphagous, feeding on apple, cherry, oaks, and probably other hardwood trees and shrubs (Wagner, 2005). In North Carolina, we have feeding records for Yaupon Holly (<i>Ilex vomitoria</i>) and Live Oak (<i>Quercus virginiana</i>). J. B. Sullivan also reared larvae from or recorded larvae feeding on Inkberry (<i>Ilex glabra</i>), American Hop-hornbeam (<i>Ostrya virginiana</i>), Bluejack Oak (<i>Quercus incana</i>), and Sparkleberry (<i>Vaccinium arboreum</i>).
