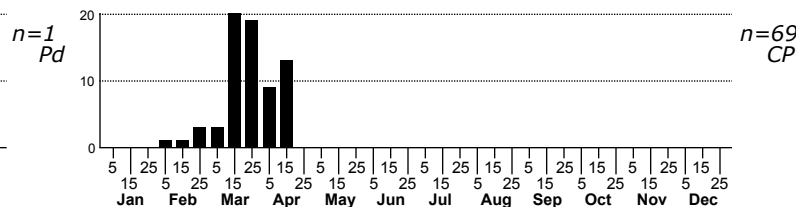
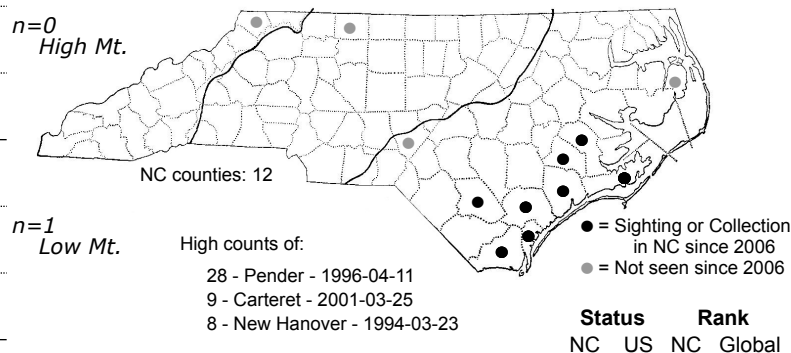
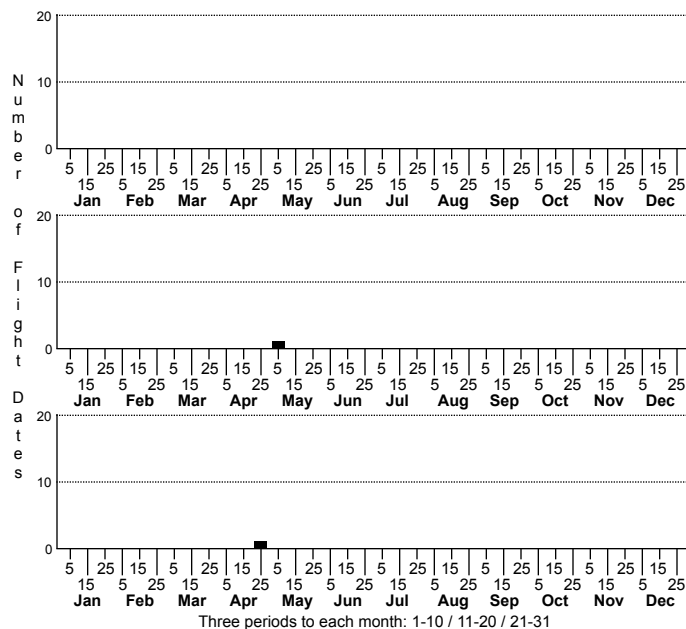

HABITAT: Barrens, woodlands, and forests (Wagner, 2005). Our records come from dune grasslands on barrier islands, longleaf pine savannas and flatwoods, and dry ridges.

FOOD: Larvae are polyphagous, feeding on apple, cherry, oaks, and probably other hardwood trees and shrubs (Wagner, 2005). In North Carolina, we have feeding records for Yaupon Holly (*Ilex vomitoria*) and Live Oak (*Quercus virginiana*). J. B. Sullivan also reared larvae from or recorded larvae feeding on Inkberry (*Ilex glabra*), American Hop-hornbeam (*Ostrya virginiana*), Bluejack Oak (*Quercus incana*), and Sparkleberry (*Vaccinium arboreum*).
