

HABITAT: Fields and coastal strand communities (Wagner, 2005). Our records come from both open habitats, including Longleaf Pine communities and old fields, but also from a wide range of forested habitats, from Coastal Plain swamps to Northern Hardwoods at high elevations.

FOOD: Larvae feed on a number of composites, including asters, dandelion (<i>Taraxacum</i>), and goldenrod (<i>Solidago</i>); also reported on clover (<i>Trifolium</i>) (Wagner, 2005). We do not have any feeding records in North Carolina.
