
Eulithis gracilineata Greater Grapevine Looper Moth



FAMILY: Geometridae SUBFAMILY: Larentiinae TRIBE: Hydriomenini TAXONOMIC_COMMENTS: One of fourteen species in this genus that occur in North America north of Mexico (Pohl et al., 2016), five of which have been recorded in North Carolina

ID COMMENTS: Similar in pattern to <i>E. diversilineata</i> but is usually paler and has two distinct dark lines crossing the median area, with the area in between filled with the pale ground color; in <i>E. diversilineata</i>, this area is filled with a darker brown shade (Forbes, 1948). The discal dot is also strongly contrasting in this species but is inconspicuous or absent in <i>E. diversilineata</i>.

HABITAT: The range of habitats used by this species in North Carolina matches both that of <i>Eulithis diversilineata</i> and Muscadine Grape. These range from maritime dunes and forests, to swamp forests, bottomlands and mesic forests, xeric sand ridges and monadnocks, cove forests and high elevation hardwoods.

FOOD: Larvae reportedly feed on grape (<i>Vitis</i>) and Virginia Creeper (<i>Parthenocissus quinquefolia</i>) (Wagner, 2005). There is also a BugGuide record (George Smiley, 2014) for a larva on Porcelain-berry (<i>Ampelopsis glandulosa</i>) in Texas. We do not have any feeding records in North Carolina.
