
Clemensia ochreata No common name

ID COMMENTS: Clemensia ochreata is slightly similar in pattern but is slightly smaller than C. albata (Schmidt and Sullivan, 2018). The ground color is also more ochraceous than in albata, which is usually a purer white; the scales along the antemdian and postmedian are particularly bright orange. The forewings in ochreata often appear dingier than in albata but the pattern of lines and spots may be more contrasting. The dark spots on the costa are darker and a medial dark patch on the base of the antemedian is particularly pronounced.
