




*Idia scobialis* Smoky Idia

ID COMMENTS: This is a blackish species with strongly contrasting white lines and spots on both the fore- and hindwings, which are nearly concolorous (Forbes, 1954). In our specimens, narrow white lines are also present on the undersides of the wings and the apex of both the second and third segments of the palps are also marked with white (Hall, pers. obs.).
