




Renia adspergillus Speckled Renia

ID COMMENTS: The ground color is gray without any brown tint; paler in the spring and "mouse gray" (dark gray) in the summer (Forbes, 1954). The antemedian is strongly scalloped and excurved. The postmedian is dentate but not marked by dots. The subterminal is clay-colored and usually broken, with thick dots on the veins. It is also preceded but not followed by a dark shade. The reniform is yellow and outlined in black; sometimes entirely black. The hindwing is concolorous.

DISTRIBUTION: Occurs essentially statewide in North Carolina, but is uncommon at higher elevations in the Mountains.

HABITAT: Our records come from most types of habitat found in the state but with only a couple from the High Mountains. Both forested and open sites are used, and xeric as well as wet-to-mesic habitats.

FOOD: Larvae feed on dead leaves and other organic debris (Wagner et al., 2011).
