
Gabara pulverosalis None



FAMILY: Erebidae SUBFAMILY: Scoleocampinae TRIBE:

TAXONOMIC_COMMENTS: One of seven species in this genus that occurs in North American north of Mexico (Lafontaine and Schmidt, 2010). Three of these species have been recorded in North Carolina (one historic record for G. obscura needs to be confirmed). One undescribed species also appears to exist.

ID COMMENTS: The ground color is mouse gray, evenly powdered on a clay-colored base (Forbes, 1954); according to Richards (1942) the ground color is almost always dark sooty gray but some dwarf forms are light to almost white. The fuscous postmedian line and black orbicular and reniform dots are distinct but this species lacks the longitudinal dark streak found in some specimens of the other species. Dark forms of <i>Gabara distema humeralis</i> are also mouse gray to black but smoother in shading than <i>pulverosalis</i> (Forbes, 1954).
