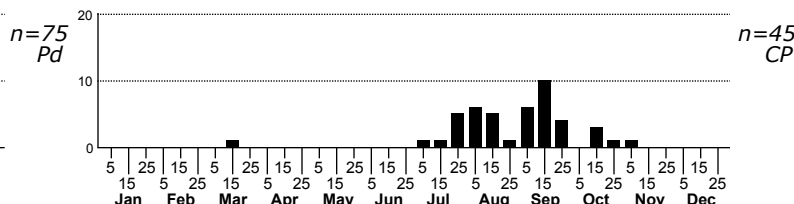
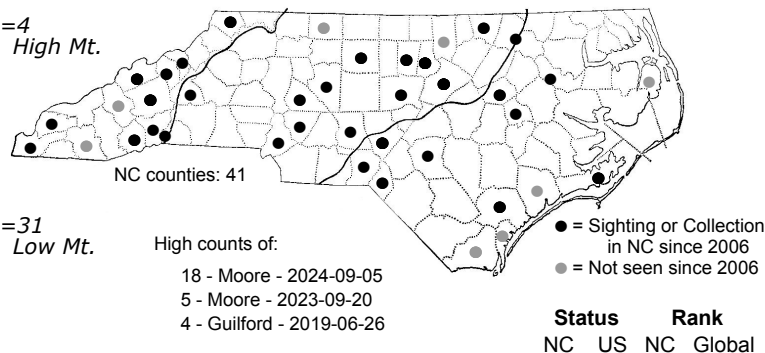
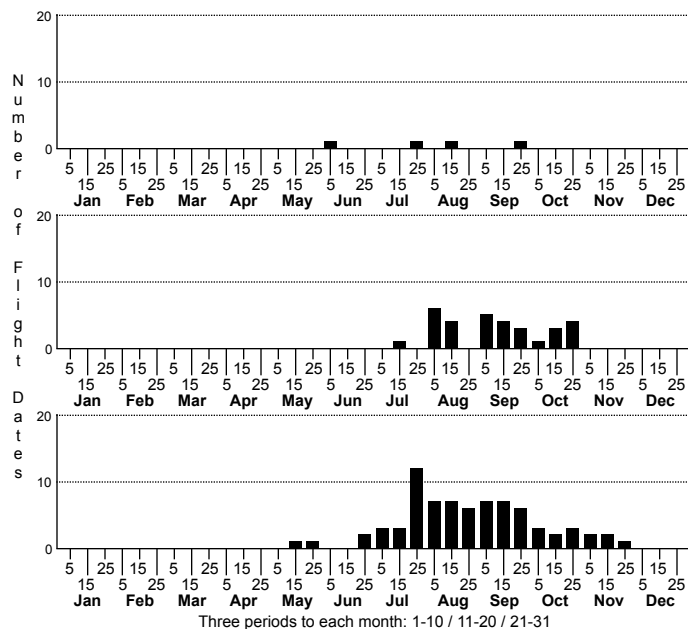


# *Ctenoplia oxygramma* Sharp-stigma Looper Moth



FAMILY: Noctuidae SUBFAMILY: Plusiinae TRIBE: Argyrogrammatini

TAXONOMIC\_COMMENTS: The only member of its genus found in the New World (Lafontaine and Poole, 1991).

ID COMMENTS: A medium-sized, dull, dark gray Looper with a contrastingly pale, elongated stigma. Lines and markings are obscure but the long, knife-shaped stigma, joined at the base by the trapezoidal orbicular, is an easy field mark for this species. Hind wings are fuscous.

DISTRIBUTION: Occurs statewide in North Carolina.

HABITAT: Our records come from a variety of open habitats from across the state, including herbaceous openings in the Mountains to maritime dunes on the barrier islands.

FOOD: Larvae are polyphagous on herbaceous plants. Crumb (1956) lists asters, goldenrod, horseweed, and tobacco (Wagner et al., 2011). In North Carolina, we have reared it from goldenrod and Groundsel-tree (*Baccharis halimifolia*).
