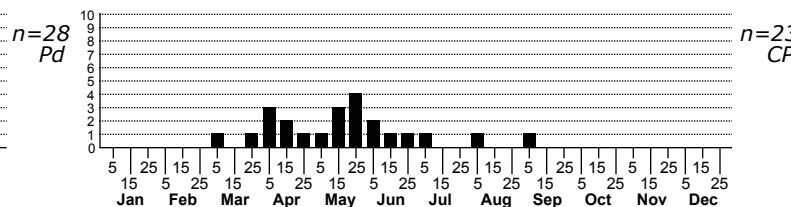
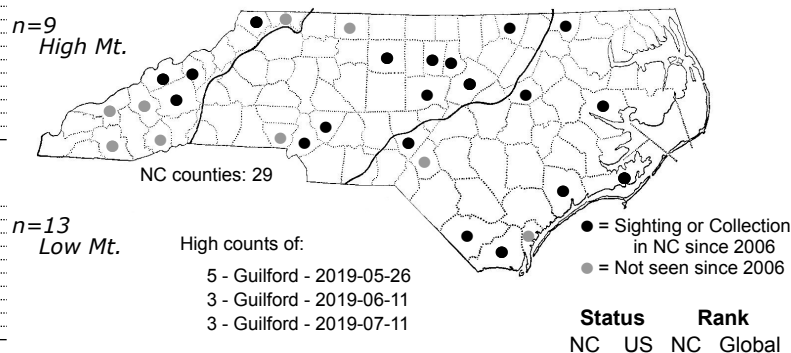
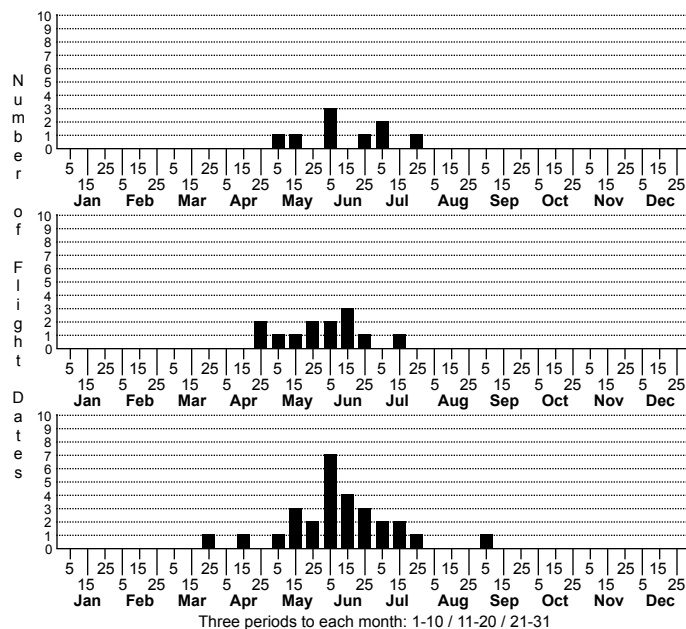


Megalographa biloba Bilobed Looper Moth



FAMILY: Noctuidae SUBFAMILY: Plusiinae TRIBE: Plusiini

TAXONOMIC COMMENTS: The sole member of this genus in North America north of Mexico (Lafontaine and Poole, 1991; Lafontaine and Schmidt, 2010)

ID COMMENTS: A medium-sized, brown Looper, shaded with red or yellow and possessing a distinctive bilobed silver stigma. The transverse lines are also silver, as is the dorsal outline of the reniform, which forms a conspicuous c-shaped mark.

HABITAT: Our records come from a wide range of open habitats. Records from the high mountains may represent migrants.

FOOD: Polyphagous, feeding on a wide variety of herbaceous plants, including crop species (Lafontaine and Poole, 1991). Wagner et al. (2011) specifically list Common Barley (*Hordeum vulgare*), Garden Lettuce (*Lactuca sativa*), Alfalfa (*Medicago sativa*), Cultivated Tobacco (*Nicotiana tabacum*), dandelion (*Taraxacum*), clover (*Trifolium*), and vervain (*Verbena*).
