

ID COMMENTS:

DISTRIBUTION: While the species in most common in the Coastal Plain in North Carolina, we have records covering much of the state with the exception of higher elevations in the Mountains.

FLIGHT COMMENT: Please refer to the flight charts.

HABITAT: Our records come primarily from open habitats and woodlands, including maritime dunes, savannas, sand ridges, and lake shorelines.

FOOD: Larvae feed on sumacs (<i>Rhus</i> spp.), including Winged Sumac (<i>R. copallinum</i>), Smooth Sumac (<i>R. glabra</i>), and Staghorn Sumac (<i>R. typhina</i>) (Wagner et al., 2011). In North Carolina, J.B. Sullivan reared a larva from Winged Sumac.
