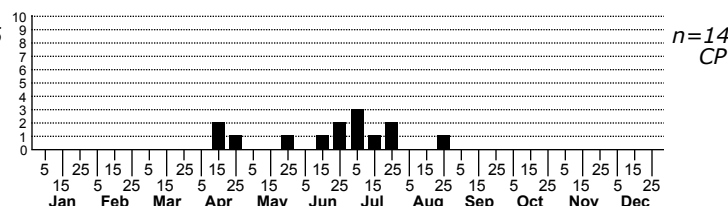
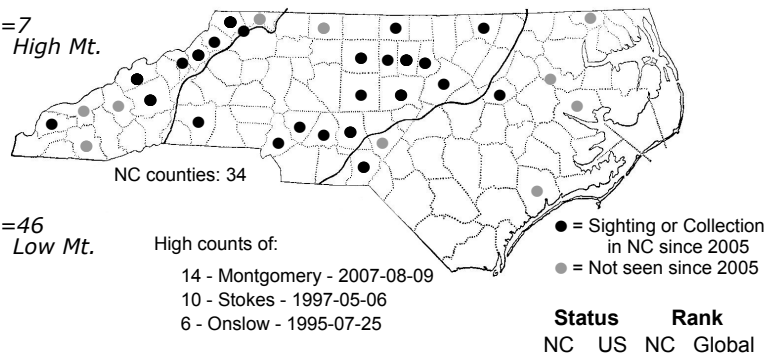
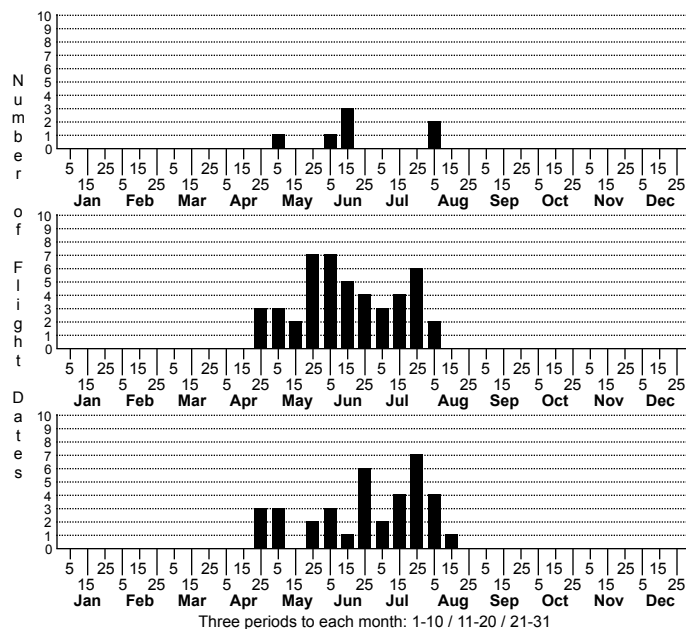

DISTRIBUTION: Nearly statewide, but rare or absent from many of the coastal counties.

FLIGHT COMMENT: Please refer to the flight charts.

HABITAT: Our records come almost entirely from rich, wet-mesic hardwood forests. These include cove forests and high elevation hardwoods in the mountains, brownwater river floodplains in the Coastal Plain, and mesic stands of hardwoods in the Piedmont.

FOOD: Larvae feed on primarily on hickories (*Carya*) and walnuts (*Juglans*) (Wagner et al., 2011). Other reported hosts include American Hornbeam (*Carpinus caroliniana*), American Hop-hornbeam (*Ostrya virginiana*), beech (*Fagus*), and ash (*Fraxinus*) (Heppner, 2007; Beadle & Leckie, 2012). We do not have any feeding records in North Carolina.
