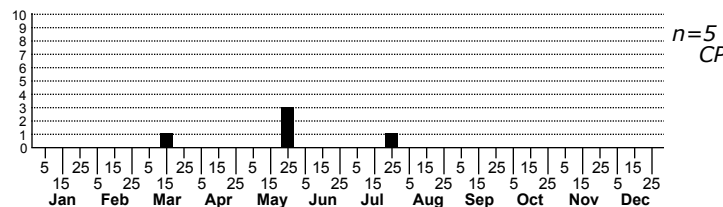
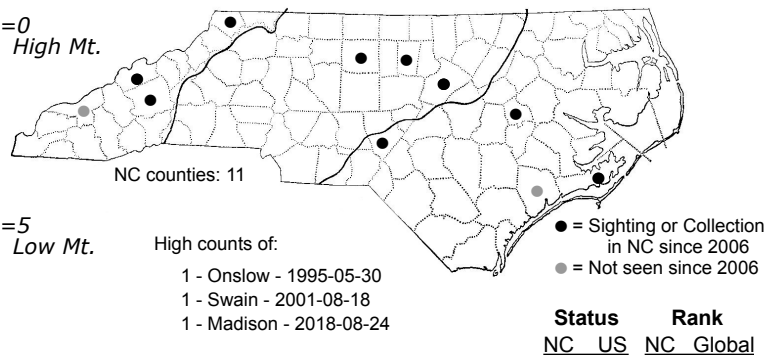
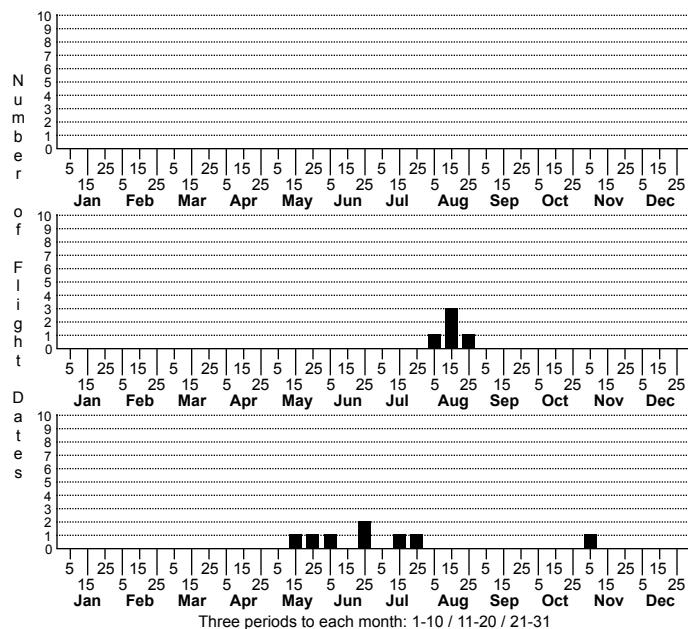


Garella nilotica Black-olive Caterpillar Moth

DISTRIBUTION: The species appears to be uncommon but widespread in North Carolina.

FLIGHT COMMENT: We have one record from May in the Coastal Plain. The rest of our records come from August in the Mountains.

HABITAT: Occupies a wide range of natural and disturbed habitats at least in the far South (Wagner et al., 2011). In North Carolina, records are sparse and come from riparian areas, but possibly without any meaningful connection.

FOOD: Larvae are polyphagous, feeding on many woody plants, including *Rhododendron* and willow (*Salix*) (Wagner et al., 2011). We do not have any feeding records in North Carolina.
