




*Nola triquetrana* Three-spotted Nola

ID COMMENTS:

DISTRIBUTION: Found in forested habitats nearly statewide.

FLIGHT COMMENT: Please refer to the flight charts.

HABITAT: Associated with hardwood forests in the Mountains, Piedmont, and at least some sites in the Coastal Plain. A possible association with pocosin habitats needs to be investigated.

FOOD: Larvae feed primarily on American Witch-hazel (*Hamamelis virginiana*) (Wagner et al., 2011), but Jim Petranka recently found larvae feeding on Large Witch-alder (*Fothergilla major*), a member of the same family as witch-hazel (Hamamelidaceae). Since at least some of our records for this species in the Coastal Plain come from savannas or pocosin ecotones, larvae should also be looked for on Dwarf Witch-alder (*F. gardenii*), a common plant along the edges of peatlands.
