
## Ponometia exigua Bicolored Bird-dropping Moth



FAMILY: Noctuidae SUBFAMILY: Acontiinae TRIBE: Acontiini TAXONOMIC\_COMMENTS: One of 34 species in this genus that occur in North America north of Mexico (Lafontaine and Schmidt, 2010), six of which have been recorded in North Carolina

ID COMMENTS: A medium-small, dimorphically-colored Acontiine. The head, thorax, and ground color of the forewings is orange-brown in the male

DISTRIBUTION: Recorded in the southern half of the Outer Coastal Plain in North Carolina

FLIGHT COMMENT: Our one record comes from August

HABITAT: Habitats used in North Carolina -- if it is in fact resident in the state -- are unclear.

FOOD: Host plants are poorly documented. Beadle & Leckie (2018) list American Burnweed (<i>Erechtites hieraciifolia</i>), but Poole (2016) reports that larval hosts are unknown.

OBSERVATION METHODS: Collected at lights.

NATURAL HERITAGE PROGRAM RANKS: GNR SNR [SNA]

STATE PROTECTION: Has no legal protection, although permits are required to collect it on state parks and other public lands.

COMMENTS: This is primarily a Neotropical species and may be only a rare stray in North Carolina. Its residency status needs to be determined before it is placed even on the Watch List.
