

HABITAT: Wagner et al. (2011) list barrens, woodland, and forests as habitats used by this species. Our records span the entire range of hardwoods in North Carolina, ranging from dry-xeric maritime forests to cool mesic Northern Hardwoods on our highest peaks.

FOOD: Larvae feed primarily on beech (<i>Fagus</i>) and oak (<i>Quercus</i>) but have also been reported on birch (<i>Betula</i>), elm (<i>Ulmus</i>), and maple (<i>Acer</i>) (Wagner et al., 2011). In North Carolina, larvae have been recorded feeding on Cherrybark Oak (<i>Quercus pagoda</i>), Willow Oak (<i>Q. phellos</i>), and Winged Elm (<i>Ulmus alata</i>).
