
## Papaipema necopina Sunflower Borer Moth

HABITAT: Our few records come from a mixture of mesic hardwoods and montane pastures.

FOOD: Larvae feed mainly on sunflowers (<i>Helianthus</i>), with the following North Carolina species specifically listed: Woodland Sunflower (<i>Helianthus divaricatus</i>), Giant Sunflower (<i>H. giganteus</i>), Sawtooth Sunflower (<i>H. grosseserratus</i>), and Jerusalem Artichoke (<i>H. tuberosus</i>) (Tietz, 1972; Robinson et al., 2010; Wagner et al., 2011). A few other composites may also be used.
